Notes from Fur Manager Jim Curran:

The bobcat market for heavy A & B+'s was very strong, \$500 up: semi heavy A & B+ \$400 & up: B & C+ \$250 -\$350. The total number of cats was down 30% from 5-year average.

The coyote market was down 50% from 2020; with the total number of coyotes down 50%

There were only 13 muskrats. In past years there were over 6,000; severe drought and few water trappers probably contributed to the decrease in numbers.

Fur sale results represent fur harvested from numerous states.

** Note: The averages listed are pelts sold, not the average that were bid which would be lower depending upon the number of NO SALE fur removed from the sale. Most no sale pelts are generally the lower value and quality which if they had been sold would decrease the average for that species.
